A New Season

We all know that relationships have seasons. Whether they're personal, familial, community based, or church based, there are times of vibrancy and times of dormancy. Vibrancy means a time to celebrate and grow, while dormancy means a time to reassess, to discern, and to yearn. Both seasons are important, particularly in our church life. Both seasons are fertile with possibilities. Both seasons cultivate strong relationships.

Around the world, our common life went into dormancy in March 2020. And even though the crisis of the pandemic has passed, many churches are still struggling to transition out of this season. Where are we at St. Bart's? From my view, I see some remnants of how the pandemic shifted our culture and how that impacts our church life. But I also see new life. I see people yearning to reconnect with a faith community. I see newcomers at St. Bart's *every single Sunday*. I sense we are moving back into a season of vibrancy—and honestly, it's thrilling.

We give thanks for the strong core of relationships that kept St. Bart's together during the season of dormancy. As we move into vibrancy, as I think we are, we will need everyone to step forward and be a part of it. We are all the core now. To fully fuel God's upcoming season for us, may we all answer the call to engage in a ministry and contribute to "Walk in Love," the fall stewardship campaign that launches in October. As I have said before, "All are welcome, all are needed!" When all step up, we can all celebrate God, contribute to our diversity, grow together, and share the gifts of this new season.

Reintroduction of the Common Cup

The “common cup” is a chalice of consecrated wine from which we all share the blood of Christ. Receiving the common cup together emphasizes the reality that we are one Body. It was a common practice before the pandemic and has been slowly reintroduced in many churches in recent times.

This Saturday and Sunday, St. Bart’s will once again offer the common cup at all services.

We will continue to distribute communion as we have been, with “one hand” receiving bread only and “two crossed hands” receiving bread intincted in the wine by clergy. If you would like to receive the common cup, hold up one hand to receive the bread and then move to the common cup. In the chapel, the common cup will be served near the piano. In the sanctuary, there will be two - one will be served near the tabernacle stand and the other near the sacristy.

However you choose to partake, be assured that you are receiving all of Christ

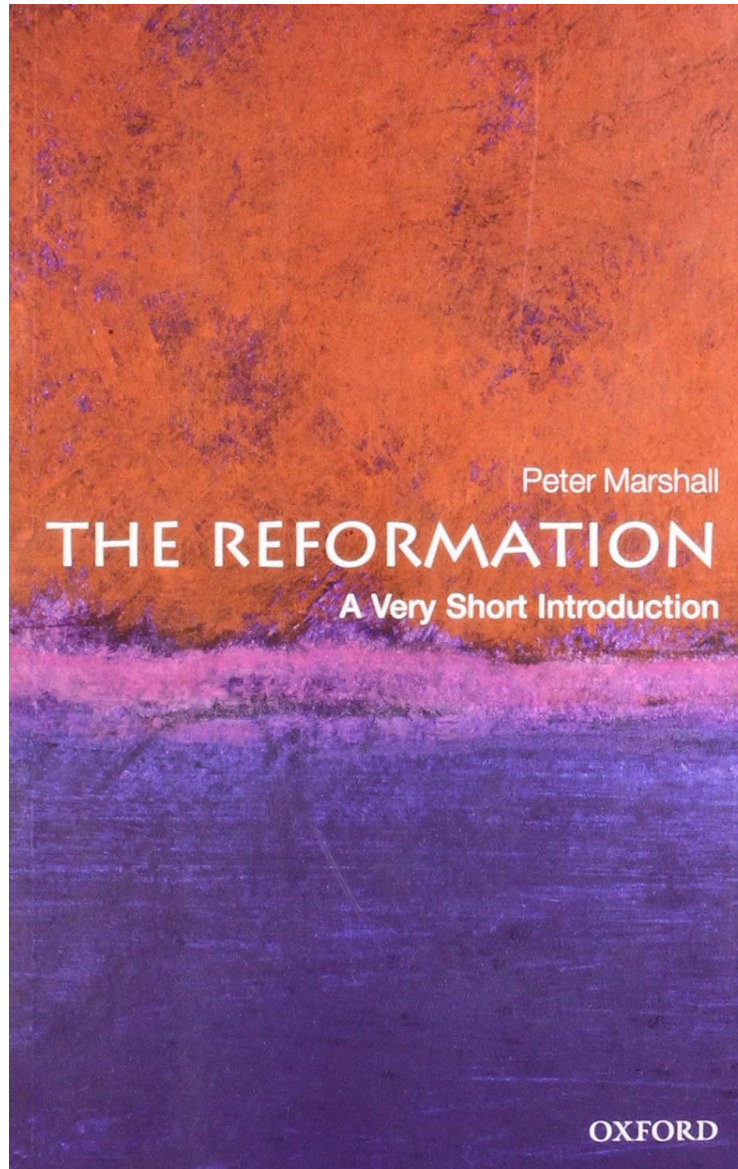

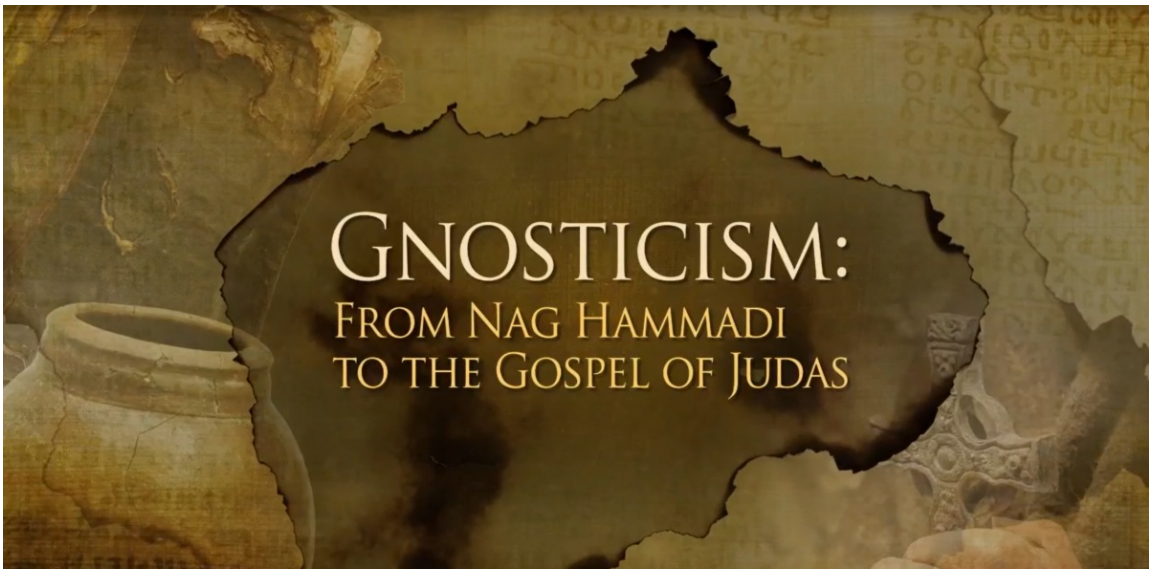

Bible Study: Gnosticism: From Nag Hammadi to the Gospel of Judas

Join Bill Zettinger and Bob Capettini as they conduct a weekly Zoom Bible study based on a DVD series on Gnosticism. Notes will be provided each week.

In the first three centuries after Jesus, there existed various forms of Christianity that were very different from what would later become the Christian orthodoxy that we practice today. Gnostics had a differing view of Christianity. They were seeking direct knowledge of God. They offered salvation from ignorance and fate through knowledge of a higher God, who was greater than the one who created our universe. This higher God sent Jesus, and they claimed that people could have mystical personal contact with that God right now.

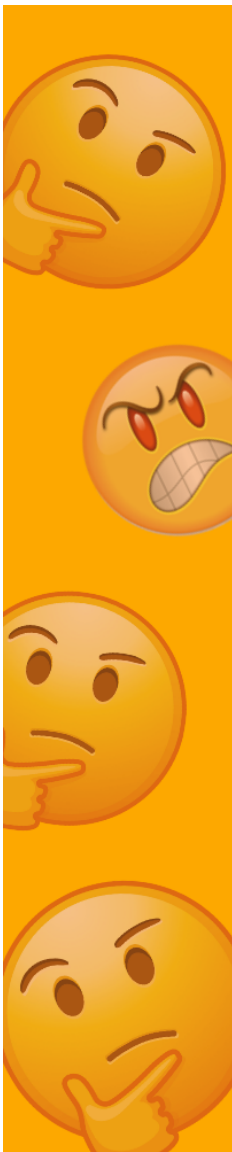

Community Conversation: More Curious, Less Furious

Wednesday, September 25, 6:30-8 p.m., Zoom

The fourth in a series of monthly discussions on relevant topics leading up to the November elections, sponsored by the Incarnation Lutheran Love Committee and the St. Bart's Episcopal Peace & Justice Ministry.

What concerns, if any, make you hesitant to express your genuine interest in the different views of another person?

Many media and culture sources promote the idea that we should view those who disagree with us as enemies. This approach limits our ability to solve the major problems of our day. Research shows that being curious and seeking multiple perspectives can open the mind, increase empathy, reduce fears, encourage self-awareness, and promote humility. Curiosity about how and why other people arrive at values and beliefs can lead to better solutions, understanding, and appreciation. Life experiences shape who we are, and

sharing stories can help bridge gaps and encourage mutual respect. We can make a choice to become more curious and less furious. In this conversation we will share thoughts and experiences about choosing to be curious.

The “Living Room Conversations” model, nonpartisan and moderated by sound norms, provides a framework for dialogue, not debate. We welcome a diverse group of participants to each standalone session.

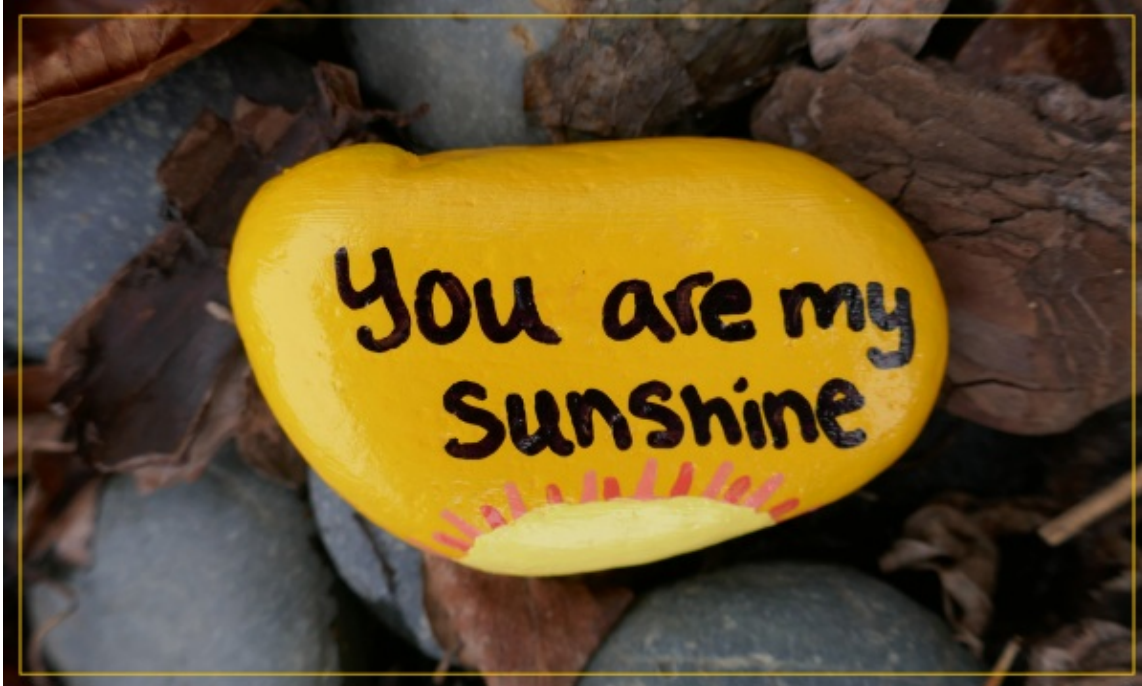

Creation Care Community Roundtable

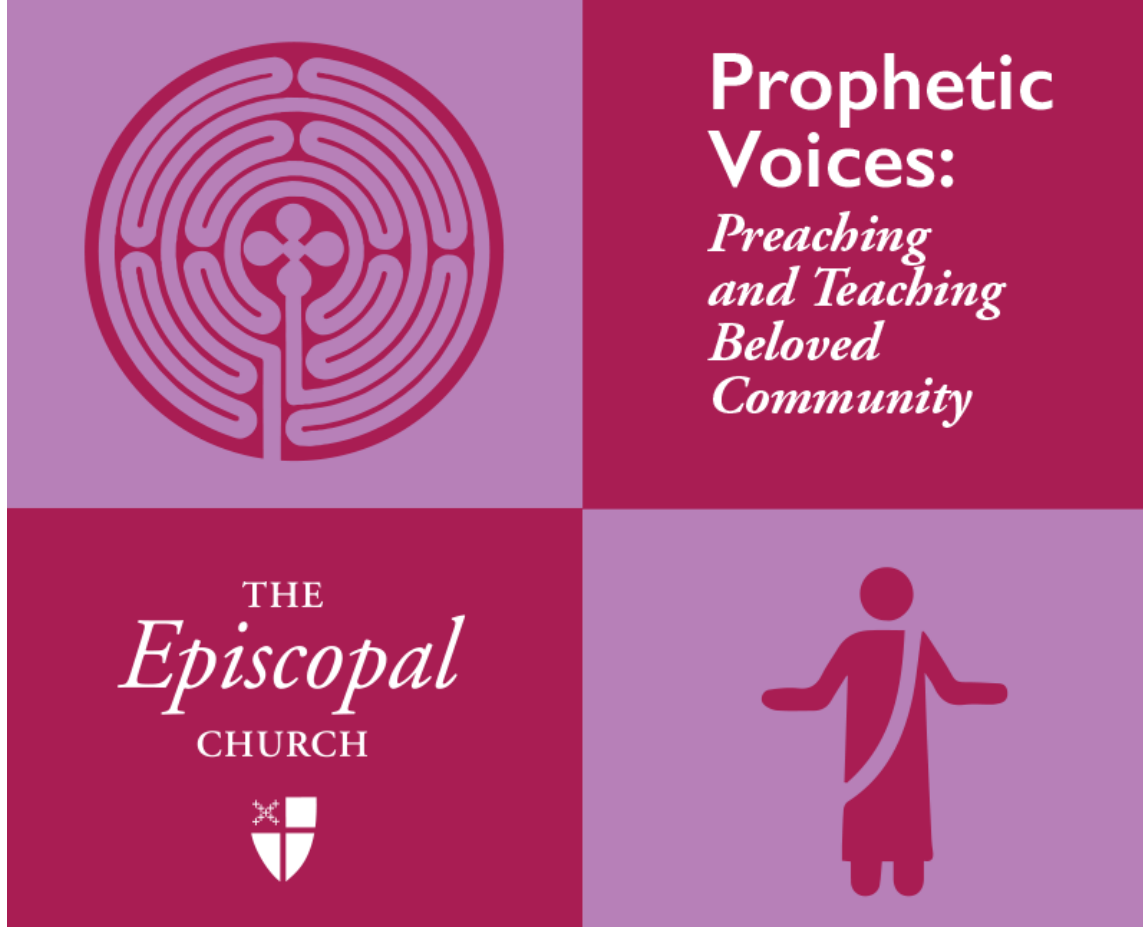
